

Editor's Note

This school year, 2019-20, has been especially unique globally, and certainly at Kivukoni as well. Through the year, we worked towards a yearbook themed on Diversity. But the year revealed a different value from students, staff and parents alike: Resilience- the ability to bounce back during and after a difficult situation.

Term 1 brought the challenge of depicting a beautiful Kenyan documentary, the Elephant Queen, as the enigmatic onstage drama: 'The Big Small World', in collaboration with the Youth Theatre of Kenya. And what a whirlwind that was! Students acted and danced their hearts out and displayed the story of characters Stephen the goose, the dung beetles and many more. It was a team effort by Kivukoni. Soon after, the Junior play, 'Sunflower in my Supper' showcased a tale about Daisy the sweet cow, in honour of Mama Zak, a beloved member of the Kivukoni community. Students remembered and celebrated her with plays, with the sunflower paintings in the dining hall and by planting sunflowers. Our term's theme was Empathy, and students internalised and practiced it through and through.

Term 2 rolled around and we learned about Perseverance, and students pushed their boundaries, testing their grit. We watched and learned about a distant illness, learning about safety measures and hoping for covid19 to stay off our shores. But Covid19 travelled the world and finally arrived in Kenya, and students suddenly switched to learning from home- with teachers and staff scrambling to deliver the lessons and resources. Despite the uncertainty, the Kivukoni community persevered.

Term 3 arrived, and we were ready with online platforms- teachers, students and parents alike learned to navigate online school. We all fumbled and stumbled but eventually we learned to walk. This term's theme was Independence, and students learned to be much more autonomous.

The ability to be resilient requires us to be adaptable- like water that takes the form of the container! We've had fun with watercolours when putting this yearbook together, adapting to the strange circumstances, and you'll find the creative ways in which Kivukoni community adapted and bounced back in the pages ahead.






Dear Year One,







What's a significant tech- related skill that students learned during distance learning?

Well, from my point of view, I will say that:

- Learners have acquired their own personal emails and can manage them confidently.
- DL has become a reality to learners and they had to embrace it. They adapted to the new system of learning and made it a reality. It stopped being the way they used to watch it in the movies and reading about it theoretically.
- It has taught most students to be independent, especially with assignments and research work online.
- Technology has become a basic need in a student's daily life.
- It is a medium of communication and a learning tool at the same time.
- Most learners can now readily interact with their colleagues and teachers though distantly apart.

How will IT classes change in the next year based on how we have all used tech this term, if there is any change at all?

IT classes will be able to evolve more quickly next year as:

- Topic IT and Computing (IT) Lessons will be much easier to teach and handle because learners have improved their computing skills greatly through the remote learning experiences.
- Students are now all good Digital Citizens; they know the right and safe sites to access ,and the responsible way to behave online.
- We will also be adopting more of the new Coding curriculum, in order to prepare students for formal Computing assessments in the near future.

What would you like to share regarding IT in term 1, 2 and 3?

- Learners have learnt a great deal about Internet Safety this year - they know what cyberbullying is and how to avoid it, as well as other pitfalls of the internet.
- Some learners, especially KS3, have developed more programming skills and most of them developed amazing Web Pages and Websites using HTML.
- Britannica has been a valuable and powerful search engine which has made learning safe and full of fun through exploration and research in all areas of learning.
- Kiddle is also used by our learners as a browser instead of Google Chrome and Firefox. Kiddle is a child friendly browser which contains only the content suitable for school children.
- Seesaw and Google Classroom have been incredible and versatile digital platforms which both students, parents and staff keep learning more and more about.
- It has been an exciting year for Information Technology at Kivukoni - and we hope to keep integrating these newly learnt skills and platforms into other aspects of school life once we are all back in real life action again.


GUESS WHO?!

Tuning In

“If music be the food of joyful little souls – play on...” (sorry Mr Shakespeare!) And play on they do! Not a day passes without tunes, rhythms and songs from every corner of school – even the playground with the giant marimba there for all to enjoy. Singing is alive and ringing in every class, and combined weekly singing sessions make for powerful experiences of musical togetherness.

Little Composers

Since September we introduced ‘children are composers’ in music class for FS2. Following a methodology from Belgium this makes listening to and writing music easy and fun for the children.

The foundation is introducing a colour for each note, and shapes like the star, the moon and the sun for the musical intervals. Then we played lots of games linking the colours to the notes, and the shapes to the intervals.

We also discovered a new musical instrument every week, so the children got to know the piano, guitar, flute, cello, ... those discoveries are magic for them and make them curious about the world of music and to learn to listen to music and instruments attentively.

Hopefully we can continue our lessons soon, and not long from now they can compose a song and write it on a musical score, effortlessly!



Music Technology


Music at Kivukoni has always been an exciting venture for students and it has not been any different with the online learning. From creating “Mountain Melodies” to writing rap songs, from playing the descant recorder to rehearsing and performing in groups using diverse musical resources, students have been abuzz throughout the year, eager to develop and produce music in many forms.

If anything, the distance learning experience this year saw unprecedented creativity especially in the component of composing music digitally. The Year 4’s and Year 7’s learnt how to create melodies and ostinato using MUSICLAB song-maker and SPLICE beat maker. The Year 6’s used music composition software called MUESCORE, whilst Year 8 also learnt how to layer music using INCREDIBOX. Our hope is that these inspiring digital resources have opened their eyes and ears to new possibilities in musical creativity, whilst still encouraging practical musicianship as much as possible as well.

While the times have indeed been challenging, most students have demonstrated resilience and determination to stay focused on their tasks. I am really proud of the effort that these wonderful students have made in making music come alive, even in the darkness.

Do you view art as just messy playtime for kids? Or do you realize it's so much more than that? Art can be good for children in many ways. Here at Kivukoni it is amazing to listen and see how our students create stories out of their work, passionately discussing the imagined events and landscapes. In Early years we explored with colours trying out different techniques and materials and exploring their qualities. In Yr1 they enjoyed collage, and using colours to express emotion. It was a great pleasure to see their Art interest and vocabulary growing throughout the year.

This has certainly been an interesting and unique year for French students. However, they made good progress, and were able to successfully adapt to the demands of distance learning. Bravo!

In KS2 we have been looking at expressing simple opinions and conversations by using adjectives and verbs, as well as exploring French culture and festivals. We ended up having each student choose a French name depending on their birthday. For the year 3's it's just the beginning of a more structured session, coupled with activities to enhance speech and listening skills. As for the year 4 class, most have acquired some basic vocabulary, hence becoming confident with trying out the simple words they have learnt for self expression.

KS3 focussed on expressing opinions in different tenses, notably, the perfect tense and the near future. We expanded our vocabulary by looking at hobbies, sports, healthy eating habits, weather, parts of the body, and describing someone's character and physical attributes. With regards to French culture,

we looked at identifying places in town and giving directions as well as telling time using both the 12 and 24-hour clock system. Well done to all of you. Merci a tous!

Project Based Learning

The Lower Secondary years 7 and 8 engage in Project Based Learning, or PBL each year. This involves a practical, real-world process of collectively choosing a project, planning the process and finally creating or delivering it. Students necessarily develop collaboration and communication skills in order to succeed, and the learning curve is steep!

Year 7 challenged themselves with projects on Diwali and a mobile library called “Books- A -Sail” in terms 1 and 2, respectively. ‘Books-a-Sail’ was a noteworthy highlight as they worked hard to design, then saw, hammer and nail, and finally paint a mobile book-cart - (or ship!) as well as manage the library system. Term 3 brought a different challenge altogether as they adapted to an online project about Kenya during school closures, and independently made elaborate presentations on various aspects on Kenya’s rich heritage and culture.

Year 8 explored healthy habits in Term 1, researching, discussing and even implementing them, tracking their own progress and the difference it made. They finally invited the community to a presentation of “Healthy Body, Healthy Mind”, where all were challenged to take better care of ourselves! ‘Astronomy’ was term 2’s project and the ‘The Traveling Telescope’ stargazing excursion was a wrap upon our experiential approach. It was a genuinely awesome experience, seeing our planet earth in a whole new perspective!

PBL continues to engage the students in new and exciting ways, giving agency to their learning, and enabling to make valuable contributions to our community, as well as self discoveries along the way.

Here are some of our lucky Kivukoni alumni who have benefited from various scholarships and bursaries of different amounts so far, from 100% at Aga Khan Academy, Woodstock (India) and Gordonstoun (Scotland), 50% at Woodland Star, and a whole range of others at Light Academy, Braeburn (Tz, Mbsa and Nbi), Shree, RVA and Somerset House (South Africa). Congratulations to all of them - and may their learning journeys continue to be enriching.
